2.	List the qualities from verses 5-7 that we should have as Christians. List the outcome these qualities produce (vs. 8-11). What are you doing to develop these qualities?

Inductive Bible Study Steps & Tools

STEP 1: Pray

STEP 2: Observe

What does the passage say?

- Read the chapter or Scripture portion. Write down anything that stands out to you.
- □ Mark Key Words: This will help you catch all the details (TIP: Use different colors for each.) As you re-read the chapter mark:
 - o References to God, Jesus, Holy Spirit.
 - Key words. These are meaningful words that may repeat and express a theme or topic.
 - Five "W"s and an "H": Mark Who, What, When, Where, Why, and How using a different color for each. You can also write out the main answers to each question as an overview.
- □ Make Lists: List every fact given about a key word or person with the Scripture reference for future use. Use only words from the text.
- □ ★ Word Studies: Go deeper with key words and other important words by looking up their meanings in the original Hebrew, Greek, or Aramaic. Use a Strong's Concordance book or access Strong's at www.blueletterbible.org:
 - Type in the Scripture and translation
 - Press the "Tool" button
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STEP 3: Interpret

What does the passage mean?

□ ★ Cross Reference: Use a cross-reference Bible, or BlueLetterBible.org "Tools", to look at similar Scriptures to help understand the context and meaning. Write down what you find.

STEP 4: Apply

What does the passage mean to you personally?

Write down your thoughts. What did you learn? What should you change in your life?
 Mark your personal application thoughts with "PA" in your Bible.

4.	How do we recognize and guard against corruption from within the church?

1.	Make a list of all the things from this chapter that Peter wants us to know about and remember. Which stands out to you the most and stimulates you to make changes in the way you live and wait for the Lord's return?
2.	The Lord's timing is not the same as ours. What is hard and beautiful about that?
3.	What is the tone as Peter concludes his final letter? What is still the most important thing for us to do (vs. 17-18)?
