### **Inductive Bible Study Steps & Tools**

STEP 1: Pray

STEP 2: Observe

#### What does the passage say?

- Read the chapter or Scripture portion. Write down anything that stands out to you.
- □ Mark Key Words: This will help you catch all the details (TIP: Use different colors for each.) As you re-read the chapter mark:
  - o References to God, Jesus, Holy Spirit
  - Key words. These are meaningful words that may repeat and express a theme or topic.
  - Five "W"s and an "H": Mark Who, What, When, Where, Why, and How using a different color for each. You can also write out the main answers to each question as an overview.
- □ Make Lists: List every fact given about a key word or person with the Scripture reference for future use. Use only words from the text.
- □ ★ Word Studies: Go deeper with key words and other important words by looking up their meaning in the original Hebrew, Greek, or Aramaic. Use a Strong's Concordance book or access Strong's at www.blueletterbible.org:
  - Type in the Scripture and translation
  - Press the "Tool" button
  - Select the "Interlinear" tab
  - Select "Strong's" number reference

1.	Read verses 1-21. Why was this information from Jesus so revolutionary to a Jewish leader like Nicodemus?

3.	How are lives changed with true belief in Christ? Why is change sometimes so difficult?
4.	What are some practical ways to live out verse 30?

# **John 4 Study Questions**

1.	The way Jesus interacted with people was never cookie-cutter, always so personal. Make note of the details that stood out to you in verses 1-30.
2.	Recall a time when you shared a testimony of what God has done in your life. What was the outcome?
3.	Both the woman in verse 7 and the nobleman in verse 46 took Jesus at HIs word. What happens when we do the same and believe without seeing?

1.	When God chooses to act He can do so anyway He wants. Which details in verses 1-15 stand out to you?
2.	How is verse 6 still so pertinent today? Who is someone you know that needs to be made well?
3.	Jesus spells out very clearly His relationship with the Father (verses 16-47). What was Jesus' challenge to the Jews?

1.	What did the miracle in verses 1-13 show and do for the multitude and the disciples? Share your personal application.
