Study Questions

Matthew 26:1-30

1. What political and religious shift takes place in verses 1-5, and why did Jesus again remind the disciples about His death? (Psalm 31:13)
2. How can we show love to Jesus as the woman (Mary) did in verses 6-13? How were the disciples acting like the pharisees and how should they have responded? (John 12:1-8, 19:40; 2 Corinthians 2:15)
3. As you read verses 14-16, what do you learn about Judas? What was his role amongst the twelve disciples? (Luke 22:3-6; John 12:6, 13:2)
4. At the Last Supper, why does Jesus bring up the subject of His betrayal? What is different between the response of Judas and that of the other 11 disciples?
5. In verses 26-30, what is significant about communion and why do we still celebrate it today?

Study Questions

Matthew 26:31-75

1. Describe the emotions of the disciples and Christ in verses 31-46, what can we learn about human frailty and divine sacrifice?
2. As you read verses 47-56 what stands out the most? What was the resolve of the disciples versus the resolve of Jesus?
3. What was the false accusation made against Jesus? What can we learn about handling adversity and opposition (vv. 57-68)?
4. Share your thoughts on Peter's crisis of faith in verses 69-75. What hope does it bring to us? (2 Timothy 1:8,9)

Inductive Bible Study Steps & Tools

STEP 1: Pray

STEP 2: Observe

What does the passage say?

- Read the chapter or Scripture portion. Write down anything that stands out to you.
- ✂ Mark Key Words: This will help you catch all the details (TIP: Use different colors for each.) As you re-read the chapter mark:
 - References to God, Jesus, Holy Spirit.
 - Key words. These are meaningful words that may repeat and express a theme or topic.
 - Five “W”s and an “H”: Mark Who, What, When, Where, Why, and How using a different color for each. You can also write out the main answers to each question as an overview.
- ✂ Make Lists: List every fact given about a key word or person with the Scripture reference for future use. Use only words from the text.
- ✂ Word Studies: Go deeper with key words and other important words by looking up their meanings in the original Hebrew, Greek, or Aramaic. Use a Strong’s Concordance book or access Strong’s at www.blueletterbible.org:
 - Type in the Scripture and translation
 - Press the “Tool” button
 - Select the “Interlinear” tab
 - Select “Strong’s” number reference

STEP 3: Interpret

What does the passage mean?

- ✂ Cross Reference: Use a cross-reference Bible, or BlueLetterBible.org “Tools”, to look at similar Scriptures to help understand the context and meaning. Write down what you find.

STEP 4: Apply

What does the passage mean to you personally?

- Write down your thoughts. What did you learn? What should you change in your life? Mark your personal application thoughts with “PA” in your Bible.

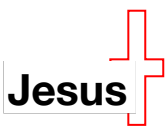
