4. Watch or listen to the chapter-by-chapter message on the book of Matthew at cclch.org.

Inductive Bible Study Steps & Tools

STEP 1: Pray

STEP 2: Observe

What does the passage say?

- Read the chapter or Scripture portion. Write down anything that stands out to you.
- ✂ Mark Key Words: This will help you catch all the details (TIP: Use different colors for each.) As you re-read the chapter mark:
 - References to God, Jesus, Holy Spirit
 - Key words. These are meaningful words that may repeat and express a theme or topic.
- ✂ Five “W”s and an “H”: Mark Who, What, When, Where, Why, and How using a different color for each. You can also write out the main answers to each question as an overview.
- ✂ Make Lists: List every fact given about a key word or person with the Scripture reference for future use. Use only words from the text.
- ✂ Word Studies: Go deeper with key words and other important words by looking up their meaning in the original Hebrew, Greek, or Aramaic. Use a Strong’s Concordance book or access Strong’s at www.blueletterbible.org:
 - Type in the Scripture and translation
 - Press the “Tool” button
 - Select the “Interlinear” tab
 - Select “Strong’s” number reference

STEP 3: Interpret

What does the passage mean?

- ✂ Cross Reference: Use a cross-reference Bible, or BlueLetterBible.org “Tools”, to look at similar Scriptures to help understand the context and meaning. Write down what you find.

STEP 4: Apply

What does the passage mean to you personally?

- Write down your thoughts. What did you learn? What should you change in your life? Mark your personal application thoughts with “PA” in your Bible.

Luke 1 Study Questions

1. What can we learn from Zechariah's and Mary's response to the angel Gabriel?
2. Compare and contrast the details of the births of John the Baptist and Jesus.
3. Go back and reread about John the Baptist in the books of Matthew and Mark. What new insights do you gain from Luke 1 about him and his relationship with Jesus?
4. What part of Mary's song (verses 46-55) stands out to you the most and why?

Luke 2 Study Questions

1. Take a moment to imagine that you were the parents of Jesus. What do you think that was like?
2. What stands out to you the most about the things we read about in this chapter?
3. What lessons can we still learn from these early accounts about Jesus' birth and life as a youth?

Luke 4 Study Questions

1. Why do you think God allowed Jesus to be tested by Satan in the wilderness? Why were these specific temptations so dangerous and evil?
2. Along with Jesus' example in Luke 4:1-13 and Matt. 4:1-11, read James 1:2-8,12-16, 4:7-8, and Romans 8:10-13. What encouragement, instruction and insight do you receive regarding dealing with temptation?
3. After what Jesus said in verses 23-27, why were the people in the synagogue so upset and wanted to throw Jesus off a cliff?

Luke 5 Study Questions

1. Make note of all the personal ways Jesus interacted with people. What moments stand out to you the most?
2. In verse 16 we read of an important practice that Jesus did often. Why was this so necessary for Him and also for us today?
3. Read verses 34-39. Summarize the analogies Jesus used. What practical points do you come away with?

Luke 6 Study Questions

1. In each situation with the Pharisees Jesus continues to cut to the heart and spirit of the matter. Even so they insist on digging in their heels. Think on persistent flesh versus persistent faith, Compare the results.
2. God's economy is opposite of the world's. What stands out to you the most when reading verses 20-38?
3. How do the word pictures Jesus uses in verses 39-49 bring to life what He is saying? What resonates with you and why?

Luke 7 Study Questions

1. What do the two stories in verses 1-17 tell us about: Jesus? The people involved? Faith?
2. Read verses 18- 30. How was the questioning of the Pharisees different than the questioning of John in regards to Jesus?
3. Sum up what Jesus was saying in verses 36-50. What kind of response is Jesus looking for from anyone who comes into contact with Him?

Luke 8 Study Questions

1. Some important people to Jesus are listed in verses 2-3. Who are they and why is it significant that they are mentioned?
2. Break down the parable in verses 4-18. What thoughts or points do you come away with?
3. After reading verses 22-39 what can we learn about Jesus' power and Satan's power?
4. Recall your favorite details of the two healings read about in verses 40-56. What stood out to you the most?

Luke 9 Study Questions

1. What were the assignments that Jesus gave the disciples? Instead of telling them to pack up all their belongings and be prepared, what did Jesus instruct them to do? How can we live in that same mindset today?
2. Why do you think Jesus told the disciples to do the seemingly impossible in verse 13?
3. What does it mean for you to do what Jesus says in verses 23-24?
4. What is the significance of Jesus, Moses, and Elijah discussing Jesus's departure (v. 31)?
5. Jesus says many strong statements throughout verses 48-62. Which stands out to you the most and why?

Luke 10 Study Questions

1. What does it mean to you to be a laborer of the harvest? How do you see yourself being a forerunner for Jesus?
2. In verses 17-24, what clarification of focus does Jesus talk about? Why do you think He redirected the disciples perspective?
3. In verses 25-37, Jesus points a certain lawyer and his questions back to the law and then also gives the parable of the Good Samaritan. See also Matthew 25:40 for more insight on the heart of Jesus and what He desires for His followers. In what ways are you challenged by this?
4. What stands out to you the most in verses 38-42? What "one thing" does David talk about in Psalm 27:4?

Luke 11 Study Questions

1. What is the correlation between Jesus' instruction on how to pray and the examples that follow? (v 1-13)
2. Jesus gives a lot of instruction and warning in verses 14-28. What stands out to you the most?
3. Many important things are said by Jesus in verses 29-54. What can we learn from the 'woe to you' statements He makes? What other thoughts or observations do you come away with?

Luke 13 Study Questions

1. What is the main theme in verses 1-5? What is Jesus getting at with His parable in verses 6-9?
2. How is the bondage of the ruler of the synagogue worse than that of the woman in verses 10-17?
3. What are your thoughts about what Jesus likened the kingdom of God to in verses 18-22?
4. Who will salvation come to? (verses 23-30)
5. What is Jesus expressing in verses 31-35?

Luke 14 Study Questions

1. What are your thoughts on the scene we read about in verses 1-14? What comes to mind when you consider reputation versus character?
2. What is Jesus addressing in the parable used in verses 15-24?
3. Following Jesus involves carrying a cross, metaphorically. How does this play out in your life practically? (verses 25-33)
4. What is the exhortation in verses 34 & 35? (See also Matthew 5:13, Mark 9:49-50)

Luke 15 Study Questions

Responding to the Pharisee's and scribe's criticism, Jesus shares three parables.

1. What is the main point Jesus is making?
2. Which parable in this chapter ministers to you the most? Explain why.
3. What do we learn about God's grace in response to true repentance in verses 20-32?

Luke 16 Study Questions

1. In verses 1-9 why did the master commend the manager? What do most people think is the purpose of having money? How is the Christian perspective radically different?
2. Why are faithfulness and fidelity such important topics to Jesus? (v. 10-18)
3. What are some points that stood out to you in verses 19-31? Think about comfort versus torment. Refer back to Luke 6:20-26.

Luke 17 Study Questions

1. Jesus gives His disciples several teachings in verses 1-10. List the topics and your thoughts.
2. What is the significance of the one man who came back in verses 11-19?
3. Jesus responds to the Pharisee's question in verses 20-37. Why were they getting ahead of themselves with this question? What can we learn from the past to keep us ready for the future? (see also Matthew 24:3-28)

Luke 18 Study Questions

1. Write down some of the lessons we can learn from the story of the persistent widow (vs. 1-8), and the story of the Pharisee and tax collector (vs. 9-14).
2. What can we learn from Jesus' responses to little children (vs. 15-17) and also to the rich young ruler (vs. 18-30)?
3. In verses 31-43 what stood out to you the most? What are some contrasts you see between the rich young ruler and the beggar?

Luke 19 Study Questions

1. As you read the story of Zacchaeus in verses 1-10, describe him before, during, and after encountering Jesus.
2. Put into your own words this parable of the ten minas for our current time. Why do you think Jesus shared it after knowing the people were thinking the kingdom of God was very near?
3. What were the things that broke Jesus' heart? Even in the midst of opposition what did Jesus continue to do in verses 41-48?

Luke 20 Study Questions

1. Why do you think Jesus chooses not to give the Jewish leaders a direct answer to their question, but instead asks them a question? How or when should we follow His example?
2. After reading verses 9-18, read Isaiah 5:1-7. How do the two correlate?
3. What should Christians do when our obligation to obey the government conflicts with our commitment to the Lord?
4. When you think about heaven, what are some misconceptions you can have? What is it about heaven that encourages and excites you?

Luke 21 Study Questions

1. Jesus has repeatedly talked about the godly use of money and possessions. Why was what the widow did so impactful that Jesus pointed it out?
2. Along with verses 5-28, revisit Matthew 24 and Mark 13. How do we keep a balanced mindset between living in the present with what will come in the future?
3. In your own words describe what is the call of every disciple of Jesus, past, present and future?

Luke 22 Study Questions

1. Discuss the downfall of Judas. What is something you learned about Jesus from how he dealt with Judas' betrayal?
2. Out of all the elements of the Passover meal they shared, why do you think Jesus choose bread and wine to represent His body and blood? Why did Jesus say we should take communion often in remembrance of Him?
3. Have you ever experienced a time like Peter did in verses 31-34 & 54-62? Why do you think Peter did the opposite of what he said he would do?
4. Throughout this chapter what direction, instruction, and focus does Jesus give his disciples as His time with them is running out?

Luke 23 Study Questions

1. Why does Luke go to great lengths to emphasize the innocence of Jesus?
2. Simon the Cyrene was forced to carry Christ's cross. What did Jesus say in Matthew 16:24-25 and Mark 8:34-35 about taking up our cross?
3. What did the tearing of the veil symbolize? Also, read Hebrews 10:19-25.
4. What hope and comfort can we take away from the story of the repentant criminal hanging next to Jesus?

Luke 24 Study Questions

1. Jesus repeatedly told the disciples that He would die and rise again. Why do you think they failed to understand and believe when the events occurred?

2. What details of the resurrection stand out to you the most?

3. Write down three things of importance to you that you learned from studying the book of Luke.
